1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Agency Coordination and Public Involvement Plan (Plan) has been developed for the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route Project (Project), in accordance to Section 6002 of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). Section 6002 of SAFETEA-LU requires lead agencies to establish a plan for the involvement of participating agencies and the public during the environmental review process associated with the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

This Plan was prepared by the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT), in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), to comply with the requirements in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other federal and state regulations during the environmental review process and will be updated throughout the life of the project as needed.

The overall goal of the Plan is to identify techniques to meet the needs of and create an atmosphere of open dialogue between SCDOT, Santee Lynches Regional Council of Governments (SLRCOG), the Bishopville community and local stakeholders. Community input is critical to the success of any project and the SCDOT and SLRCOG are committed to providing meaningful public involvement opportunities throughout the environmental review process, in accordance with NEPA. This Plan will identify the techniques and methods to assist in establishing a level of trust and respect between the community, local stakeholders, SCDOT and SLRCOG.

Outreach will focus on residents, businesses and identified stakeholders within the City of Bishopville and Lee County. The Plan details specific activities designed to ensure members of the public receive key information and have opportunities to provide meaningful input in decisions affecting their community, while building on information gathered during the development of the previous environmental review process during the development of the Environmental Assessment (EA). It details the techniques and communication tools developed to engage the public and provide the opportunity to participate in the environmental review process during the development of the EIS. Overall, the Plan is designed to be flexible based on the project and the communities need while providing the public an opportunity to participate in the environmental review process.

The Plan will be implemented at the onset of the project, continues through the publication of the Notice of Intent (NOI) in April 2017 and is anticipated to be completed in the Spring 2020, with the approval of the Final EIS (FEIS)/Record of Decision (ROD).

1.2 PROJECT BACKGROUND

The City of Bishopville is in Lee County, in the northeast quadrant of the state and is serviced by the major transportation facilities of I-20, US 15, SC 341 and SC 34. US 15 is a north/south highway that becomes Main Street as it travels through downtown Bishopville. Main Street serves as the primary corridor through the downtown area, connecting I-20 to Bishopville, Hartsville, Bennettsville, and other surrounding towns in the area.

The environmental review process under NEPA was initiated in 2010, and an EA was completed in the Fall of 2012. The EA identified and analyzed seven alternatives to provide alternate routes for large trucks currently traveling through downtown Bishopville on US 15/N. Main Street. Initial public outreach activities included charrettes and community meetings along with a Public Information Meeting. Several individuals spoke out in opposition of the project at the November 2012 Public Hearing. At that time, the City of Bishopville and Lee County could not agree on the preferred alternative. A Public Information Meeting was held in February 2015 where the public was updated on the project and options moving forward. Due to the considerable negative public comment on the project, FHWA stated that an EIS would need to be prepared if the SLRCOG decided to move forward with the environmental planning process. In a letter dated March 27, 2017, the SLRCOG reiterated its support for completing the NEPA process for the project. Thus, SCDOT, SLRCOG, and FHWA have restarted the NEPA process. The FHWA published a NOI to prepare an EIS in the Federal Register on April 14, 2017.

US 15 (N. Main Street) through downtown Bishopville is currently a two-lane roadway with a raised median and on-street parking. On average, over 700 large commercial trucks travel through downtown daily. The purpose of the project is to address the existing and future truck traffic traveling through downtown Bishopville. The EIS for the proposed project will consider the No-Build Alternative as well as build alternatives within the identified project study area that would meet the purpose and need of the project. The EIS will promote informed decision making in the development of a solution to address truck traffic through the downtown area. This EIS will also evaluate options which may enhance the economic development of the area.

1.2.1 PROJECT AREA




Figure 1, Project Location Map

The project study area is generally defined by the area bordered by US 15/I-20 Interchange to the southwest, US 15 just north of Bethune Highway (SC 341) to the northeast, the intersection of Pinchum Sly Road (S 15) and Camden Highway (SC 34) to the northwest and the intersection of Wisacky Highway (SC 341) and Mac Stuckey Lane (local road) to the southeast (**Figure 1**).

By August 22, 2019, the 24 possible alternatives were refined down to three (Alternatives I, N, and T) and the project study area was refined to the area bordered by US 15/I-20 Interchange to the southwest, US 15 just north of Bethune Highway (SC 341) to the northeast, and the intersection of Wisacky Highway (SC 341) and Mac Stuckey Lane (local road) to the southeast.

2. AGENCY COORDINATION

2.1 RESOURCE AND REGULATORY AGENCY COORDINATION

This Plan outlines the process by which SCDOT and FHWA will communicate information about the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route project to Cooperating, Participating and other agencies as well as elected officials, to identify issues early and come to a mutual agreement for addressing those issues/concerns and resolve technical issues in an expeditious manner. Agency coordination will be conducted in compliance with SAFETEA-LU Section 6002.

2.1.1 LEAD AGENCIES

SCDOT and the FHWA are joint lead agencies for the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route Project. As lead agencies, SCDOT and FHWA are responsible for agency scoping, inviting cooperating and participating agencies, developing consensus among a wide range of stakeholders with diverse interests, resolving conflict and ensuring that quality transportation decisions are fully explained in the environmental review process.

2.1.2 COOPERATING AGENCIES

Cooperating Agencies will be involved in the NEPA process in accordance with the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations for implementing the procedural provisions of NEPA (40 CFR 1501.6). According to CEQ (40 CFR 1508.5), "cooperating agency" means any Federal agency, other than a lead agency, that has jurisdiction by law or special expertise with respect to any environmental impact involved in a proposed project or project alternative. In addition to participating in scoping, Cooperating Agencies become involved in the review of NEPA documents before public distribution. This cooperation facilitates the development of the NEPA document so that it may be adopted by the Cooperating Agencies to satisfy (partially or wholly) NEPA obligations for future project approvals.

Cooperating Agencies for the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route project include:

• U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)

2.1.3 PARTICIPATING AGENCIES

SCDOT and FHWA will consult with Participating Agencies to ensure their views are considered in the NEPA documentation process, and that the substantive and procedural requirements of all Participating Agencies are met. Participating agencies are those with an interest in the project. Their roles and responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

• Participating in the NEPA process starting at the earliest possible time, especially with regards to the development of the purpose and need statement, range of alternatives, methodologies, and level of detail for the analysis of alternatives.

- Identifying, as early as practicable, any issues of concern regarding the project's potential environmental or socioeconomic impacts. Participating agencies also may participate in the issue resolution process described later in this guidance.
- Providing meaningful and timely input on unresolved issues.
- Participating in the scoping process.

3. AGENCY OUTREACH METHODS

The Public Involvement Team will prepare and distribute correspondence to federal, state, and local elected officials (current as of November 22, 2019) to present project updates, public involvement notifications, planning process information, and schedule. At the alternative development phase, updates will be prepared and distributed to regional/local elected officials to present reasonable alternatives developed and screened for further evaluation in the EIS. 3.2 AGENCY MEETINGS

The SCDOT's standing Agency Coordination Effort (ACE) meetings will be used to provide project updates and coordinate with Cooperating and Participating Agencies. Agencies will be notified in advance that the ACE meeting will be used to satisfy the Section 6002 requirements for the Bishopville Project. The ACE meetings will be utilized as a forum for agencies to provide input on:

- Response to NOI/Invitation to be a Cooperating and Participating Agency
- Project Study Area
- Schedule for the Environmental Review Process
- Technical Analyses/Reports Methodologies
- Agency Coordination Public Involvement Plan
- Project Purpose and Need
- Alternative Analysis and Methodologies for Screening Alternatives
- Identification of a Preferred Alternative

For each meeting, DRMP will coordinate and/or provide meeting materials as appropriate that may include: agendas, handouts, sign-in sheets, etc., subject to SCDOT and FHWA approval. Meeting minutes for each ACE meeting will be provided for review and comment. As of this update, the Bishopville Truck Route Project was discussed at the following ACE meetings:

- June 8, 2017: the purpose of the meeting was to reintroduce the project, obtain comments, and identify potential issues related to the project
- August 8, 2017: the purpose of the meeting was to get input/feedback on the technical analysis methodologies
- November 8, 2018: the purpose of the meeting was to get input/feedback on the alternativescreening methodology and get input on proposed project segments
- August 8, 2019: the purpose of the meeting was to get input/feedback on the alternativescreening process and proposed build alternatives that would be evaluated in the DEIS

3.3 SECTION 106 REQUIREMENTS

Another aspect of agency coordination will be fulfillment of Section 106 requirements under the National Historic Preservation Act. SCDOT will consult with South Carolina State Historic Preservation Office. Section 106 consultation regarding adverse effects on historic properties will be conducted as part of this EIS.

3.4 TRIBAL COORDINATION

Early coordination efforts have identified the following Native American tribes and groups within the Community Outreach Area: Catawba Indian Nation, and the Tuscarora Nation. The Coordination Team will facilitate proper coordination practices with the Native American tribes and groups, to solicit input regarding the project.

3.5 FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS

The Plan and all associated outreach will comply with Section 6002 of the SAFETEA-LU:

- Joint lead agency status will be determined and documented
- Lead agency will send Letters of Invitation to Participating and Cooperating Agencies
- Coordination plan will be developed with consultation of Participating Agencies
- Schedule for the environmental review process will be developed through consultation with Participating Agencies
- Participating Agencies and the public will have an opportunity for involvement on the purpose and need
- Participating Agencies and the public will have an opportunity for involvement on the range of alternatives
- Appropriate methodology to be used and level of detail required in analysis will be determined in collaboration with Participating Agencies

4. PUBLIC OUTREACH STRATEGY

4.1 PUBLIC OUTREACH STRATEGY METHODS

The public outreach strategy is based on a review of demographic data, telephone calls, in-person interviews and/or meetings with residents, businesses, stakeholders, local officials, and a physical review of the project area. Demographic information was obtained through a thorough review of 2010 Census Data, the 2012 approved EA, the American Community Survey (ACS) 2012-2016, and information provided from consultants and SCDOT.

An initial field visit of the project area was conducted in June 2016 to assess the community, the geographical configuration, and to meet with FHWA, SCDOT and SLRCOG. In-person meetings were conducted with City and County elected officials and staff, civic and business leaders, as well as SLRCOG staff to obtain initial feedback regarding past and present concerns surrounding the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route project. The field visit provided the Public Involvement Coordination Team the opportunity to identify key community members and/or stakeholders to be contacted as part of the outreach efforts for the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route project. Each source provided unique and specific insight into the culture, issues, and concerns of the community, as well as the history of the City of Bishopville and constraints that exist regarding the proposed roadway.

4.2 OUTREACH GOAL AND OBJECTIVES

The primary goal of the public outreach efforts is to establish and maintain communication between the community, SCDOT and SLRCOG regarding issues and concerns surrounding the development of a new route for trucks. Due to the anticipated high level of community interest and concern, public involvement objectives include:

- Establish trust with the community
- Reset the public involvement process with the community
- Provide ample opportunity for residents and businesses to express their concerns and demonstrate the Coordination Team has heard and understood their issues
- Continually monitor community concerns
- Conduct extensive public outreach efforts to gather input from the community and inform the public on alternative development and the EIS preparation process
- Educate the community regarding the project, the EIS, and the NEPA process

4.3 KEY MILESTONES, ISSUES AND STRATEGIES

The Plan identifies several key project milestones. These include:

- Public Scoping May 9, 2017
- Development of Preliminary Study Corridors Winter 2017/Spring 2018
- Refined Alternatives Summer 2019

- DEIS Public Hearing Spring 2020
- Final EIS/Record of Decision (ROD) Fall 2020

Through previous outreach efforts during the EA process and recent SLRCOG listening sessions on March 1st and 2nd, 2017, the following key issues were identified:

- Need for improved project communications
- Public concern regarding the location of previous alternatives from the EA study
- Public concern regarding impacts from the previous study alternative
- Lack of widespread and diverse public involvement

The following strategies have been developed to address these issues during the current environmental planning process:


- Distribute information across varying media platforms (local signage, flyers, emails, mail, website, etc.) in a timely fashion to notify the public during project milestones
- Promote an open and transparent public involvement process that inspires trust through inclusion and clear, consistent information in an easy to understand manner
- Provide transparent information on project process, possible outcomes, and impacts regarding potential alternatives
- Reach different facets of the public by customizing outreach approaches for the individual characteristics of each community
- Achieve compliance with Environmental Justice and Title VI requirements by ensuring that traditionally under-represented populations have equal access to the decision-making process
- Partner with residents, community groups, vendors, and business owners to support the outreach efforts

4.4 PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT AND OUTREACH AREA

Initial outreach efforts will cover the entire City of Bishopville and extends from the previous EA map, to provide for more alternative options. The proposed outreach area for the project is outlined in red (see **Figure 2, Project Outreach Map**). The outreach area encompasses the City of Bishopville as well as the surrounding community outside the city limits. Outreach efforts will seek to reach the following groups:

- Property owners within the outreach area
- People, property, and businesses potentially impacted by the proposed project
- Community organizations
- Special interest groups
- Environmental Justice and Title VI-related groups and organizations, and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) populations

By the August 22, 2019 public meeting, the proposed alternatives were screened against the project's purpose and need and refined to Alternatives I, N, T, or slight variations of these alternatives. Because these three Alternatives and their variations are on the east side of US 15 (Main Street), the focus of the outreach shifted to concentrate on the above-mentioned communities in the refined study area especially:

- Property owners within the outreach area
 - \circ The Green Acres Community
 - Residents on Edgefield Road
 - Farmers within the study area
- People, property, and businesses potentially impacted by the proposed project including:
 - Lynches River Apartments
 - Apartments along South Lee Street
 - The Lowcountry Council on Aging
 - Robert E Lee Academy
 - o Happy China Restaurant
 - o Stokes Craven Motors
- Community organizations
- Special interest groups- especially farming related.
 - o Clemson Extension

4.5 STAKEHOLDER IDENTIFICATION

To reach out to all interested and other potentially affected parties regarding the proposed project, the Coordination Team has researched and identified key stakeholders and groups to form a contact database. The contact database will be updated throughout the life of the project and serve as the information distribution mailing list and as a tracking list for all outreach activities. The contact list is broken out by new contacts gathered at meetings and through comments, apartment complexes, community organizations, religious organizations, local officials, Chamber of Commerce members, Outreach Area Parcels, and US 15 Parcels.

4.6 PUBLIC OUTREACH TOOLS

Various tools can be applied to inform, conduct the community outreach efforts, and encourage meaningful participation from the community. Listed below are examples of various tools that can be implemented during the public outreach process.

4.6.1 MEDIA OUTREACH TOOLS

Local Radio Stations

Press releases can be used to announce public meetings as well as to provide project information and updates to the community.

Local Television Stations/Newspapers

There will be opportunities for interviews on local and cable television channels. Personnel from SCDOT will be available for interviews to discuss issues, updates, and/or concerns regarding the project.

4.6.2 OTHER COMMUNICATION TOOLS

Postcards and Letters

Postcards and letters can be used as notification for public meetings and other outreach. These materials will be distributed at least two weeks prior to each community meeting to ensure maximum notification and participation. Printed information includes the time, date, location, and detailed specifics about upcoming meetings. Letters to property owners located near the project build alternatives were sent out in early 2018. Postcards were developed for the August 22, 2019 meeting and mailed prior to the meeting.

Local Signs

Signs along US 15/Main Street in the project outreach area will be used as notification for upcoming public meetings. Signs will be posted at least one week prior to each community meeting. There will also be opportunities to use the chamber of commerce marquee sign to advertise upcoming meetings.

Project Website

A project website (www.scdot.org/inside/BishopvilleTruckRoute/) will provide the public 24/7 access to current information and documents related to the project. This site includes information geared to help decrease public misinformation regarding the project and provide insight into the environmental review process. The information will be clear and timely so the public can provide relevant input based on their understanding of the project and the process. The Coordination Team will provide updates to the website on a regular basis to ensure the most current and accurate information is available. Requests were made to the SLRCOG and City and County governmental agencies to link the project website on to their websites. The SLRCOG added a link to project website to their Transportation page. The project website will include:

- A historical overview of the project
- The project purpose and need
- National Environmental Policy Act information
- Acronyms and definitions
- Frequently Asked Questions
- Public comment opportunities
- Project materials and documentation
- The latest project news including upcoming public meetings

Project Handouts

Handouts and other materials will be developed for each public meeting. Handouts will include a project overview, the project purpose and need, and a schedule with milestones with next steps.

4.7 PUBLIC OUTREACH TECHNIQUES

Techniques referred to as "low touch" and "high touch" will be used as part of the community outreach efforts. "Low touch" technique includes the use of a project website, social media, and email. "High touch" technique includes face-to-face meetings, flyers, and telephone calls.

Public outreach techniques for the Proposed Bishopville Truck Route project will include three phases of meetings: Stakeholder Meetings, Community Meetings, and Public Information Meetings. The purpose of these meetings is to capture the communities past and present concerns, issues, and needs as they relate to the project. Stakeholder and Community Meetings will be held early in the process, prior to the development of design alternatives.

For each meeting, DRMP and Civic Communications, LLC will:

- Secure the locations, dates, and times.
- Coordinate any facility contracts, if needed.
- Provide logistics, equipment, and security, if required.
- Setup and breakdown the meeting location.
- Develop meeting materials (handouts, sign-in sheets, notifications, etc.).
- Staff tables for discussion, registration, materials, etc.
- Facilitate discussion and record comments.

4.7.1 COMMUNITY MEETINGS

Upon completion of the SLRCOG listening sessions (March 1-2, 2017) for the business, agricultural, industrial, and non-governmental organizations (NGO) sectors, a Community Meeting was held May 9th, 2017 at Lee Central High School:

- Meeting notifications for the community meetings were consistent with the methods outlined in the Public Outreach Tools section of this plan.
- Display boards and handouts were developed in English and publicized through venues mentioned under the Public Outreach Tools.
- Translated meeting and outreach materials were provided as needed based on identification of LEP populations.
- Participants were provided with multiple options to provide input, including written comment forms, and directly to the Coordination Team.
- The Coordination Team collected, organized, and disseminated all the comments made by the participants and prepared a report to be posted on the project website.
- Coordination Team members attended training prior to the first Community Meeting.

Community Education and Listening Sessions

A Community Education and Listening Session was held May 9, 2017 to officially introduce the project to the community and discuss the project scope. The meeting presented how the previous EA process led to the development of a Purpose and Need and EIS process. Materials provided project background and explained the NEPA process. The purpose of this meeting was to move the community beyond the previous environmental review process and introduce the current project.

The meeting was an open house format with no formal presentation. Stations were set up to present information on the project history, an explanation of the EIS process, and the current purpose and need. Discussion tables allowed attendees the opportunity to discuss with Coordination Team members what is presented at the stations.

Neighborhood Outreach Listening Sessions

As the alternatives are further refined, neighborhood meetings may be held at Green Acres, Lynches River Apartments, along Edgefield Road, and/or at the apartments off of South Lee Street to provide more information on how a preferred alternative could impact residents.

4.7.2 PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETINGS

Public Information Meetings will be held to present and get feedback/input on the proposed project alternatives. General methodologies for Public Information Meetings are:

- Develop meeting notifications for Public Information Meetings that are consistent with the methods outlined in the Public Outreach Tools section.
- Develop display boards, maps, and handouts and make them available through venues outlined in the Public Outreach Tools.
- Translate meeting and outreach materials as needed for Limited English Proficiency (LEP) populations.
- Provide participants with multiple options to provide input, including written comment forms and through the project website.
- Collect, organize, and disseminate the comments received, prepare response letters if requested, and prepare a summary report that will be posted on the project website.

The first Public Information Meeting was held on June 7, 2018 to present the preliminary alternative study corridors developed to date and receive input on the presented corridors. The meeting was open house format with a self-running presentation was available to provide project background information prior to the public entering the display area. Display maps of the 24 preliminary corridors were presented for public review and comment.

The second Public Information Meeting was held on August 22, 2019 to present the three proposed build alternatives, which were identified after evaluating a wide range of initial alternatives. The meeting was an open house format with a self-running PowerPoint presentation that provided detailed project information prior to the public entering the display area. Displays of the three proposed build alternatives (Alternatives I, N, and T) were presented for review and comment and team members were available to answer questions.

4.7.3 OTHER PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT AND OUTREACH TECHNIQUES

Environmental Justice and Title VI Outreach

Special outreach is being conducted to include populations not typically well represented in the process (e.g., minorities, ethnic groups, low-income populations, limited-literacy, LEP, and individuals with disabilities). Tailored approaches have been designed to reach these populations. Efforts include press releases, advertisements, and email notifications; and outreach meetings with Title VI/Environmental Justice groups. These efforts will adhere to the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits discrimination in programs receiving federal assistance, and relevant provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act; as well as Executive Order 12898 on Environmental Justice - Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations.

According to US Census data (2014 American Community Survey), low-income and senior populations are included in the population of Bishopville and surrounding area in Lee County. Potential strategies for reaching these populations are:

- Identify and reach out to any City and/or County Senior Housing and/or community centers or groups including the Lee County Council on Aging.
- Present the project to the Lee County Rural Leadership and Interagency Coalition (RLI/Interagency Coalition). The RLI/Interagency Coalition includes representatives from multiple agencies and is focused on community health and wellness.
- Focus efforts on under-represented populations by reaching out to community leaders, community centers, churches, senior housing facilities, and public agencies.

4.7.4 ONGOING OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

Stakeholder Advisory Committee meetings will be held to present study progress and receive ongoing input. The advisory committee will include representatives from local communities, local governments, and regional governments. Preparation of presentations and handouts will be coordinated with the Coordination Team prior to these meetings, and comment and meeting summaries will be developed for each meeting. The Stakeholder Advisory Committee may include representatives from the following:

- City of Bishopville
- Lee County
- The LINK
- Robert E. Lee Academy (Private School)
- Santee Wateree Regional Transportation Authority (SWRTA)

Additional stakeholder meetings will be held as necessary. These may include meetings with homeowner associations, civic groups and/or clubs, EMS and fire personnel, business owners, faith-based organizations, and special interest groups. The preparation of presentations and handouts will be coordinated with the Coordination Team prior to the stakeholder meetings. Any follow-up or action items will be distributed to the appropriate team members for response.

4.8 COMMUNICATION TRACKING AND MANAGEMENT

Project Database

The Team is maintaining database to track different forms of participant interaction and stakeholder contacts. Contact information such as addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses will be used for notification purposes and project updates. Phone numbers will be included for participants that do not have access to electronic methods of communication. The database contains meeting information such as dates, locations, and attendees. Information collected from project comment forms, Title VI forms and meeting sign-in sheets will be captured and recorded in the database. Participants will be given a choice of if and how they would like to receive project updates (e.g., US mail or email).

4.9 MONITORING OUTREACH AND INVOLVEMENT

All project outreach efforts will be tracked and documented in accordance with NEPA, and reasonable efforts will be made to evaluate the effectiveness of outreach tools and activities including, meeting notification/communication methods, Environmental Justice/Title VI outreach methods, and community meetings. These tools and activities will be evaluated through the following:

- All meeting participants will be asked to provide meeting notification source at meeting sign-in. Responses will be documented and analyzed for each meeting to determine the effectiveness of each method and future use.
- The number of participants at each meeting will be counted and documented.
- Mailing lists will be updated and evaluated to identify trends and issues.
- All comments will be documented and assessed for trends and notable concerns.
- The project database, including the addresses of comment writers, meeting attendees, and community leaders, will be pinpointed on Google Earth KMZ files to understand the participation and feedback connects with each alternative.
- As the alternatives are even further refined, the plotted contacts will be utilized to build upon their engagement for neighborhood meetings.

On Wednesday June29th, Larry Weston and I met with the Mayor and City Administrator for the City of Bishopville and the Project Manager and Assistant Project Manager with the SCDOT. The purpose of this meeting was to establish a working relationship with the City of Bishopville and to provide information about the coming outreach efforts that will cull the issues, concerns and ideas of those in the impacted areas of the soon to be determined plans to alleviate truck traffic in downtown Bishopville.

In attendance were: Alexander Boyd – Mayor, City of Bishopville Gregg McCutchen – City Administrator, City of Bishopville Jacob Meetze, Assistant Project Manager, SCDOT Bener Armado, Sr. Project Manager Larry Weston, Project Manager, Neighborhood Solutions Portia d'Alcantara, Sr. Public Involvement Manager, Neighborhood Solutions

Neighborhood Solutions and the SCDOT representatives met to listen to the concerns of the Executive branch of the City of Bishopville. We learned that the overarching concerns expressed by the Mayor and City Administrator at the meeting were, the lack of transparency in the former process of proposing alternatives for alleviating truck traffic in downtown Bishopville and the lack of neighborhoods' involvement in the process. Other issues of concern were:

- Inclusion of impacted areas adjacent to Bishopville in Lee County
- Planning for a bypass on the west side and not the east side of Bishopville
- Encouraging economic development on the west side of Bishopville
- Communicating an outreach message that all that has been proposed has been "scrapped' and that nothing is being considered until the communities concerns and ideas have been heard and documented (per the Mayor and City Administrator)
- Ensuring NS/SCDOT meetings with:
 - Craig Nesbit City Council Member Bishopville
 - Willie Mae Muldrow, City Council Member and Bishopville Mayor Pro Tem
 - Carrie Gass, Architectural Review Board

 - Gloria Lewis , Zoning Board Bishopville
 - William McElveen, Farmer whose land was affected by the original proposed bypass

The Santee Lynches Regional Council of Governments conducted a series of listening sessions on March 1st and 2nd, 2017 for the proposed new roadway in Bishopville, SC. Members of the Bishopville downtown commercial, agricultural, industrial, and non-governmental organization sectors were invited to provide feedback on areas where the previous truck route study could have been improved, issues and concerns surrounding economic development in the Bishopville area, and the role a new roadway supports economic development. Project team members from SCDOT, Federal Highway Administration, DRMP, and Neighborhood Solutions were in attendance. A total of 28 participants attended the four sessions over the two-day period. Out of the 28 participants 1 person attended two sessions.

Downtown Commercial Sector Wednesday, March 1st 9:30am 12 Attendees

- Truck traffic wasn't an issue until the medians were installed on Main Street made as part of a road-diet to eliminate truck traffic
- The rerouting of trucks and traffic off Main Street will harm small businesses
- Fix local roads instead of building a truck route
- Objective of proposed roadway needs to be clearly identified safety, truck removal
- Safety should be a factor truck presence in community causes danger
- Truck drivers don't want to drive through town
- Trucks are not stopping downtown only US Food trucks making deliveries to Subway
- All thru traffic does not intend to stop in Bishopville
- Call the project a truck route, not a bypass the name bypass causes community concern
- Include a truck stop on the truck route to increase economic development in the area
- Truck traffic prevents residents from going downtown perceived danger
- Some customers no longer go downtown to shop, request home delivery instead based on on-street parking and concerns with trucks traveling thru
- Want to see downtown become more pedestrian-friendly
- Pedestrian safety should be a consideration truck speed and vegetation are a concern

- City is currently implementing its own economic development plan
- What are the traffic forecasts for the next 10 years? What are the anticipated impacts of the increase in traffic?
- What is the benefit of leaving Main Street the way it is?
- How will the port traffic in Dillon affect Bishopville?
- Would like to see a more well developed business community in Bishopville
- Would like more jobs in Bishopville to reduce commuting to other communities (Camden) for employment opportunities (Continental Tire, Invista, Sunoco, etc.)
- Not everyone in county is interested in economic development or success of downtown Bishopville
- Would like to draw large businesses to the area use the two industrial parks they currently have
- There is a lack of affordable land and utilities access for small businesses in the county
- The current industry growth is near I-20
- Communities perception of a bypass is I-20
- Remove the trucks from downtown and get the cars to stop in downtown
- What was done in Andrews to improve their downtown after the bypass?
- Camden is an example of how to incorporate a bypass and maintain a downtown

- Fix local roads and bridges instead of building a bypass/truck route
- Initial project presented alternatives to agricultural community without prior notification of a proposed project
- County officials were in favor of the project, city official were opposed
- Make a decision either way the delay is causing financial impacts to agricultural community
- Farmland is scarce it would be difficult to relocate if impacted not in favor of splitting property in a non-usable manner
- Bypass will take business away from town
- Would like to see more industry in Bishopville
- Wait until new industry is brought to Bishopville before considering a bypass/truck route
- Industry currently clusters around I-20

- Coke had plans to expand services, which led to the gate being placed on Cousar Street
- No complaints to Coke from neighbors about their trucks going through the neighborhood
- Route planning for Bishopville plant is done elsewhere
- Coke has 130 employees
- Lee County Observer is the best method for providing project meeting notifications
- Favorable to a project website

Thursday, March 2nd 6:00pm NGO Sector 4 Attendees

- Concerned with the lack of growth in Bishopville area it is dying
- Provide better notification to community groups about stakeholder meetings the COG should contact groups directly and not rely on word of mouth notice by residents
- A lot of the local pastors do not live in Bishopville and therefore cannot speak for parishioners who are residents
- Need to reach out more to the diverse business owners regarding the project
- Should consider holding another listening session to get more involvement from the community
- Inform local officials and newspaper to inform community of future meetings
- Including more community members early in the process would produce more feedback – more effective and easier to address issues with larger groups
- Make info on meeting notices clearer on what will take place
- There was a lack of communication with the community regarding the previous project
- Truck traffic downtown is a concern
- Concerned with property takings and the impact on neighborhoods near first proposed project alternatives
- Northwest area would be a better location for route less property and community resources would be impacted





















We would like to welcome you to the first scoping meeting for the proposed Bishopville Truck Route project. The purpose of this evening's meeting is to reintroduce the project to you as we now move into the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement. Many of the details as to why we are headed in the current direction with the project are included in the project handout that was available at the sign-in table. The primary purpose of this evening's meeting is to present our draft purpose and need for the project and to listen to what you have to say about the project. Your concerns, insight or just your preferences. This information is very important to us as the project moves forward. This presentation will provide you with an overview of what you will see this evening. After you make your way through the displays this evening you will see several tables set up. There will be a project team member present at each table and we would appreciate it if you could sit down and share your thoughts and ideas for the project respectfully.



The project originally started back in 2010 and lead to the development of an Environmental Assessment in 2012. In 2014 the City of Bishopville and Lee County in coordination with the Santee Lynches Regional Council of Governments, suggested revisions to the South Carolina DOT on the project's purpose and need. Because of anticipated strong **public opinion** associated with the project, the Federal Highway Administration instructed the South Carolina DOT to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement. The notice of intent for the project was published last month and tonight is our first public scoping meeting.




The study area is roughly bounded by the US 15 / I-20 Interchange to the south, Bethune Highway to the north, Intersection of Pinchum Sly Road and Camden Highway to the west, and the intersection of Wisacky Highway and Mac Stuckey Lane to the east.



We are working towards completing the environmental document in the Fall of 2019. As you can see by the schedule, there are a number of steps we must follow in the EIS process. We are anticipating design alternatives to be completed in the spring of 2018 and will be presenting them at a future public meeting currently scheduled for Summer 2018. Selection of an alternative will be made in the fall of 2019. Keep in mind that this selection could be a No-Build alternative. If the No-build is selected, all future phase will be cancelled. The No-Build option is evaluated and considered as part of all analyses as required by the National Environmental Policy Act. It is used as our benchmark to determine what will happen if the project isn't built.





This describes in a little more detail the Steps to complete an EIS. If a build alternative is selected as part of the environmental and planning analyses, the project will move into final design and ultimately construction. Those activities have not yet been scheduled. If the No-Build alternative is selected, this step will not occur.



An Environmental Impact Statement looks at a wide range of environmental issues including natural resources, community impacts and physical resources. These analyses all go into the decision making process to select a preferred alternative.



This is the main reason we are here this evening, to discuss the draft purpose and need for the project. The current purpose and need is similar to what was presented in the previous study and is comprised of two parts. The primary purpose is to reduce the number of trucks traveling along Main Street through downtown Bishopville. The secondary purpose will be to enhance the economic development of the area. As alternatives are developed, their ability to meet these purposes will be evaluated.



The reason we are looking at this project is the high number of trucks which pass through downtown. Over 700 trucks pass thru downtown daily and we will look at reducing the existing and future truck congestion along Main Street.



Another important reason we are here this evening is to receive your input on the project and help define the project scope. In addition we will also be holding scoping meetings with state and federal environmental agencies to receive their input on the project.



Tonight's meeting will not be your only opportunity to share your comments with us. Future public meetings and hearings will be held throughout the project life and you are always welcomed to email, mail or call Jacob with any comments or questions you have at any time. His contact information can also be found in the handout you received this evening. At this time, if you have not already done so, I invite you to make your way through the displays and then take some time at one of our discussion tables to share your thoughts and viewpoints on the project.

Project Background

The environmental review process under National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) was initiated in 2010, with an Environmental Assessment (EA) completed in the Fall of 2012. The EA document identified and analyzed seven alternatives to provide alternate routes for large trucks currently traveling through downtown Bishopville on US 15/N. Main Street. Initial public outreach activities included charrettes and community meetings along with a Public Information meeting. A number of individuals spoke out in opposition of the project at the November 2012 Public Hearing. At that time, the City of Bishopville and Lee County could not agree on a preferred alternative. A Public Information Meeting was held in February 2015 where the public was updated on the project and options moving forward. Due to the considerable public controversy with the project, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) directed the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) to reinitiate the environmental planning process and prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) of all applicable factors if the project was to continue.

SCDOT, in cooperation with FHWA, will prepare an EIS on a proposal to provide a truck route in the vicinity of the City of Bishopville. US 15/N. Main Street is currently a two-lane roadway with a raised median and on-street parking. On average, 700 large trucks traverse this corridor daily.




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Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) Overview

NEPA requires Federal agencies to prepare Environmental Impact Statements (EIS's) for major Federal actions that significantly affect the quality of the human and natural environment. An EIS is a full disclosure document that details the process through which a transportation project was developed, includes consideration of a range of reasonable alternatives, analyzes the potential impacts resulting from the alternatives and demonstrates compliances with other applicable environmental laws and executive orders. The EIS process is completed in the following steps:

- » Notice of Intent (NOI) Published in the Federal Register by FHWA to signal the initiation of the process
- » Purpose and Need Describes why the project is necessary and documents the goals for the project. This is developed with input from the public, state and federal agencies
- » Draft EIS (DEIS) Provides a detailed description of the proposal, purpose and need, reasonable alternatives, the affected environment, and presents analysis of the anticipated beneficial and adverse environmental effects of the alternatives



- » Final EIS (FEIS) Addresses comments on the DEIS and identifies, based on analysis and comments, the Preferred Alternative
- » Record of Decision (ROD) Identifies the Selected Alternative, presents the basis for the decision, identifies all the alternatives considered, and provides information on the adopted means to avoid, minimize and compensate for environmental impacts



On behalf of Lee County Council, I want to share an overview of the importance of the proposed Truck Route under consideration by SC Dot and FHA for construction in Lee County. This project has been a priority for County Council for over a decade and the reasons for the need for this project have become more clear and demonstrable with each year which has passed as this project has been discussed, analyzed and reviewed. There are two primary purposes and/or needs for this project; improving the safety of the citizens in the downtown area of Bishopville due to the high volume of truck traffic and creating a corridor for new growth in proximity to the most developed area of our rural county, Bishopville, which has been in decline for several decades.

The issue of improving safety in the downtown of Bishopville by rerouting truck traffic has been at the forefront of every survey and transportation need discussion in Lee County for over 20 years. SC DOT has conducted numerous traffic counts which clearly demonstrate the high volume of truck traffic traveling through a two lane commercial district and the safety concerns this raises. Local surveys have reflected the concerns of local citizens regarding traveling to the downtown commercial area for fear of parking on Main St. and facing the heavy volume of traffic, especially the large trucks traversing the downtown streets. SC DOT traffic counts show over 700 trucks per day pass through downtown Bishopville and this number is projected to increase considerably over the next decade as the Port of Charleston continues to grow and the economy continues to develop throughout this region of the state. The SC DOT representative conducting the formal presentation at the Scoping Meeting on May 9 in Bishopville made reference to the number of trucks observed by SC DOT personnel visiting Main St. and the problems the trucks present.

When examining the potential economic impacts of a truck route being constructed around Bishopville there are two major positive outcomes which can be achieved. First, the removal of trucks from the two block core commercial district of the downtown, as well as the extended commercial areas between Hwy. 341 North and the Exit 116 interchange, will alleviate a major obstacle to recruiting and retaining businesses. There is a private effort underway to revitalize the downtown area of Bishopville and this effort has been bolstered by a \$1 million dollar private donation towards purchasing and restoring vacant buildings to attract new merchants. One of the major concerns when interviewing potential entrepreneurs to the downtown is the volume of truck traffic discouraging customers from coming into the area; two successful local businesses have relocated out of the downtown core district towards the interstate to mitigate this issue; Jared's Ace Hardware and BoSmith Furniture Co. The effort to restore the downtown properties and make them attractive to perspective business owners as well as shoppers is being greatly hindered due to the truck traffic issues.

The second major economic benefit of a truck route being constructed is the potential for growth associated with a new roadway and infrastructure corridor in proximity to the developed interstate interchanges at exits 116 and 120. Lee County has a Comprehensive Plan that was last updated in 2010; Page 79 of this document, under Proposed Long Range Land Development Plan, item #2- Bishopville Growth Area- describes the following: "The Bishopville area between Interstate 20, highways 341 and 15 and the City of Bishopville is projected to experience the greatest amount of growth over the next 5 to 20 years. The factors influencing this development are 1) the availability of water and sewer systems in the area, 2) the excellent transportation access provided by I-20, Highway 15 and Highway 341, 3) the availability of developable sites, 4) the amenities offered by living near or in an urban area." The construction of a roadway dissecting the open farmland between Bishopville and the interstate which can be subsequently enhanced with water and sewer infrastructure is the needed enhancement this community is desperate for to make this potential for growth a reality.

There is a clear purpose and need for this project to move forward and address the concerns detailed above. Every year this project is delayed is another year of safety issues faced by our residents and visitors to the community as well as the loss of economic growth potential for this community presented by a project of this scope.

The concerns of the individuals opposed to this project due to the negative impacts on their particular personal situation are certainly valid and understood by County Council. The Council implores those in charge of developing this project to make every effort to limit the negative impacts on farmers and private property owners when developing the potential routes for new construction. Dealing with the issue of road construction is never easy in any

community; there will always be impacts on individuals which cannot be entirely avoided. It is the collective view of the majority of Lee County Council the benefits of a truck route being constructed far outweighs the negative impacts on individual property owners in the community.

Thank you for your consideration of this information and feel free to contact my office for any additional assistance I can provide as this process moves forward.

I talked to engineer Jacob Meetze from my hospital bed in Sumter. I was unable to attend the meeting at Lee Central, although I did go to the first meeting, looked at maps and decided then this was not a good thing for Lee County or the city or for businesses already here. I hold a master's degree with much course work on top of that. I am currently almost 78 years old.

Now that I am back at home in Bishopville, I wrote the following while in hospital.

As a forty-year resident of Bishopville, residing at 215 South Heyward Street, I am still in opposition to the proposed by-pass for the following reasons:

- 1. Arable farmland will be lost. Farming is the biggest industry in the county. The world's population is growing at an alarming rate. We need to preserve farmland.
- 2. A 1958 classmate of my husband, donated \$1,000,000 to Greater Bishopville to restore two blocks of our historic downtown put on the National Register of Historic Places in1988 when surveyed by Clemson University architectural students, just before Hurricane Hugo.
- 3. This individual also donated \$500,000 to nother entity in town. After my husband's death, he donated a family owned building to the Lee County Arts Council in my husband's memory. After Hurricane Hugo, one of the anchor buildings, the Lee County Opera House, roof destroyed, was saved.
- 4. We already have a by-pass in I-20.

There are probably other things I could add, but I need to rest and let my pain medicine kick in

We have contracted to have a solar farm built on these tracts of land. The panels have already been ordered and the solar farm will be built long before a bypass can be built. If the solar farm has to be removed, someone will be liable to pay the two landowners about \$200,000 a year for the 30 years that the contract specifies.

I am a county council member for Lee County. I agree that something needs to be done. I have concerns about how close the bypass will come to Robert E. Lee Academy. The noise of trucks climbing to cross a bridge over the railroad tracks will be very disruptive to learning. I'm speaking from experience as one who drives an 18 wheeler frequently.

Originally, the truck route was to only go from Hwy. 15 to Hwy. 341. Could this still happen and the western route go from Hwy. 15 on the west side to Browntown Road? This would be a true bypass that would touch all the main roads leading in and out of Bishopville. It would be a little more expensive, I realize. Because I have been involved with economic development for a number of years in my role as councilman, I have considered the impact on both the east and west sides carefully. I know that even though water and sewer are available on the east side, the bypass will cut the tracts into such small

parcels that they won't be useful for industrial development. There are bigger tracts on the west side that would be better for development than what would ultimately be available on the east side.

If the solar farm has to be removed, someone will be liable to pay the two landowners about \$200,000 a year for the 30 years that the contract specifies.

I am a county council member for Lee County. I agree that something needs to be done. I have concerns about how close the bypass will come to Robert E. Lee Academy. The noise of trucks climbing to cross a bridge over the railroad tracks will be very disruptive to learning. I'm speaking from experience as one who drives an 18 wheeler frequently.

Originally, the truck route was to only go from Hwy. 15 to Hwy. 341. Could this still happen and the western route go from Hwy. 15 on the west side to Browntown Road? This would be a true bypass that would touch all the main roads

leading in and out of Bishopville. It would be a little more expensive, I realize. Because I have been involved with economic development for a number of years in my role as councilman, I have considered the impact on both the east and west sides carefully. I know that even though water and sewer are available on the east side, the bypass will cut the tracts into such small parcels that they won't be useful for industrial development. There are bigger tracts on the west side that would be better for development than what would ultimately be available on the east side.

I know that you have a hard job in front of you. I also know that we will not eat any financial losses. I will be glad to discuss this further with you. I can be reached at 803 229-5122.

COMMENT: On behalf of Lee County Council, I want to share an overview of the importance of the proposed Truck Route under consideration by SCDOT and FWHA for construction in Lee County. This project has been a priority for County Council for over a decade and the reasons for the need for this project have become more clear and demonstrable with each year which has passed as this project has been discussed, analyzed and reviewed. There are two primary purposes and/or needs for this project; improving the safety of the citizens in the downtown area of Bishopville due to the high volume of truck traffic and creating a corridor for new growth in proximity to the most developed area of our rural county, Bishopville, which has been in decline for several decades.

The issue of improving safety in the downtown of Bishopville by rerouting truck traffic has been at the forefront of every survey and transportation need discussion in Lee County for over 20 years. SCDOT has conducted numerous traffic counts which clearly demonstrate the high volume of truck traffic traveling through a two-lane commercial district and the safety concerns this raises. Local surveys have reflected the concerns of local citizens regarding traveling to the downtown commercial area for fear of parking on Main St. and facing the heavy volume of traffic, especially the large trucks traversing the downtown streets. SCDOT traffic counts show over 700 trucks per day pass through downtown Bishopville and this number is projected to increase considerably over the next decade as the Port of Charleston continues to grow and the economy continues to develop throughout this region of the state. The SCDOT representative conducting the formal presentation at the Scoping Meeting on May 9 in Bishopville made reference to the number of trucks observed by SCDOT personnel visiting Main St. and the problems the trucks present.

When examining the potential economic impacts of a truck route being constructed around Bishopville there are two major positive outcomes which can be achieved. First, the removal of trucks from the two-block core commercial district of the downtown, as well as the extended commercial areas between Hwy. 341 North and the Exit 116 interchange, will alleviate a major obstacle to recruiting and retaining businesses. There is a private effort underway to revitalize the downtown area of Bishopville and this effort has been bolstered by a \$1million dollar private donation towards purchasing and restoring vacant buildings to attract new merchants. One of the major concerns when interviewing potential entrepreneurs to the downtown is the volume of truck traffic discouraging customers from coming into the area; two successful local businesses have relocated out of the downtown core district towards the interstate to mitigate this issue; Jared's Ace Hardware and BoSmith Furniture Co. The effort to restore the downtown properties and make them attractive to perspective business owners as well as shoppers is being greatly hindered due to the truck traffic issues.

The second major economic benefit of a truck route being constructed is the potential for growth associated with a new roadway and infrastructure corridor in proximity to the developed interstate interchanges at exits 116 and 120. Lee County has a Comprehensive Plan that was last updated in 2010; Page 79 of this document, under Proposed Long-Range Land Development Plan, item #2-Bishopville Growth Area- describes the following: "The Bishopville area between Interstate 20, highways 341 and 15 and the City of Bishopville is projected to experience the greatest amount of growth over the next 5 to 20 years. The factors influencing this development are 1) the availability of water and sewer systems in the area, 2) the excellent transportation access provided by 1-20,

Highway 15 and Highway 341, 3) the availability of developable sites, 4) the amenities offered by living near or in an urban area." The construction of a roadway dissecting the open farmland between Bishopville and the interstate which can be subsequently enhanced with water and sewer infrastructure is the needed enhancement this community is desperate for to make this potential for growth a reality.

There is a clear purpose and need for this project to move forward and address the concerns detailed above. Every year this project is delayed is another year of safety issues faced by our residents and visitors to the community as well as the loss of economic growth potential for this community presented by a project of this scope.

The concerns of the individuals opposed to this project due to the negative impacts on their particular personal situation are certainly valid and understood by County Council. The Council implores those in charge of developing this project to make every effort to limit the negative impacts on farmers and private property owners when developing the potential routes for new construction. Dealing with the issue of road construction is never easy in any community; there will always be impacts on individuals which cannot be entirely avoided. It is the collective view of the majority of Lee County Council the benefits of a truck route being constructed far outweighs the negative impacts on individual property owners in the community.


The project originally started back in 2010 and lead to the development of an Environmental Assessment in 2012. In 2014 the City of Bishopville and Lee County in coordination with the Santee Lynches Regional Council of Governments, suggested revisions to the South Carolina DOT on the project's purpose and need. Because of anticipated strong **public opinion** associated with the project, the Federal Highway Administration instructed the South Carolina DOT to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement. The notice of intent for the project was published last month and tonight is our first public scoping meeting.



The study area is roughly bounded by the US 15 / I-20 Interchange to the south, Bethune Highway to the north, Intersection of Pinchum Sly Road and Camden Highway to the west, and the intersection of Wisacky Highway and Mac Stuckey Lane to the east.



We are working towards completing the environmental document in the Fall of 2019. As you can see by the schedule, there are a number of steps we must follow in the EIS process. We are anticipating design alternatives to be completed in the spring of 2018 and will be presenting them at a future public meeting currently scheduled for Summer 2018. Selection of an alternative will be made in the fall of 2019. Keep in mind that this selection could be a No-Build alternative. If the No-build is selected, all future phase will be cancelled. The No-Build option is evaluated and considered as part of all analyses as required by the National Environmental Policy Act. It is used as our benchmark to determine what will happen if the project isn't built.



This describes in a little more detail the Steps to complete an EIS. If a build alternative is selected as part of the environmental and planning analyses, the project will move into final design and ultimately construction. Those activities have not yet been scheduled. If the No-Build alternative is selected, this step will not occur.




An Environmental Impact Statement looks at a wide range of environmental issues including natural resources, community impacts and physical resources. These analyses all go into the decision making process to select a preferred alternative.



This is the main reason we are here this evening, to discuss the draft purpose and need for the project. After introductions, Jacob Meetze (SCDOT) presented the PowerPoint presentation provided during the Public Scoping Meeting (May 9, 2017) and the Joint Council Meeting (July 25, 2017). During the presentation, it was asked how long it would take to get from Step 1 (Initiate EIS) to Step 6 (Make a Decision), with a response given of two years. Jacob Meetze provided the three generalized topics each of the 44 comments received from the Public Scoping Meeting (available on the project website) were identified under.

Carl Gibilaro (DRMP) informed the group of what can be expected as a stakeholder member. Members were to serve in an advisory role, providing information received from the project team to their community groups/organizations. Members would gather comments from their appropriate communities and relay the information to the project team. Meetings were to occur quarterly, with the possibly of being conducted monthly, depending on the current phase of the project. Meetings will be scheduled for one hour, with some meetings possibly extending beyond an hour if more detailed topics, such as meetings where alternatives and impacts, are discussed. It was concluded amongst the group that meetings will be held on Thursday's, in the evening, with the next stakeholder's meeting to be scheduled in the early part of next year (2018).

Administrator) asked if those in attendance were to be the representatives in the group or if additional members were to be included. Kyle Kelly (Santee Lynches Regional Council of Government (SLRCOG)) identified how the members were selected. The SLRCOG compiled a list of community groups/organizations, along with the four neighborhoods, that have shown interest in the past or could provide information to assist in the process. This list was taken to the Joint Council Meeting and a request was made for officials to provide additional members in the community. The list was provided to SCDOT to initiate letters to potential attendees. It was suggested by the project team that if there are any additional members or groups in the community that were not represented at the meeting, to provide their name and points of contact to the project team. Jumetta Posey (Neighborhood Solutions) would be sending the sign-in sheet to all members following the stakeholder's meeting to add additional names of individuals or groups/organizations who should be represented.

Meoceania Lewis Wells (Business Owner) asked why only two representatives from the business district were asked to participate. Ms. Lewis Wells did not receive a letter but was notified by Council Woman Wells (City of Bishopville) regarding the meeting and mentioned more businesses on Main Street should be represented in the group. Carl Gibilaro (DRMP) expressed the purpose of these meetings is for a single representative to be present for each group. For consistency, the selected representative should attend as many of the meetings as possible. Jumetta Posey (Neighborhood Solutions) added the invitation letters that went out were not an exclusionary process but an inclusionary process. Stakeholder Meetings are a process where the project team is reaching out to a single representative for multiple groups/organizations in the community, to meet with their identified groups to present materials and collect feedback. It was stated that the project team was available to meet with each individual group/organization to help ensure miscommunication did not materialize.

Chris McKinney (SLRCOG) asked who was funding the study and who would make the final decision (SCDOT, FHWA, etc.) as to the alternative selected. Mr. McKinney brought to the group's attention that, factual data would need to be identified and presented prior to a final decision being made. The study has been completely budgeted and paid for with earmark funds (80% federal/ 20% local), with the 20% local funds being provided by the County Transportation Committee. FHWA representatives are assisting the project team through the study process and have been in attendance for the Public Scoping Meeting and Joint Council Meeting.

Gloria Lewis (City of Bishopville) asked how the need for the project was determined. Kyle Kelly (SLRCOG) provided a brief history on the project. The project was originally identified in the 2005 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and had funds allocated by the Board of Directors. The Council set aside \$15 million for the studies. SLRCOG allocated dollars to the City of Bishopville based on issues at that time, brought up by the community through the LRTP. Mr. Watkins (Lee Co. Administrator) asked who the members of the Board of Directors were during this time. Mr. Kelly was not able to identify the members from 2005, but did provide the names of the Board of Directors today.

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www.scdot.org An Equal Opportunity Affirmative Action Employer 855-GO-SCDOT (855-467-2368) Gloria Lewis (City of Bishopville) asked if taking of property and different alternative methods, such as toll roads, were going to be evaluated during the environmental process. Carl Gibilaro (DRMP) instructed that all factors, including environmental justice, were to be evaluated. Resources evaluated during this process would include natural, human and economic features. The final recommendation from the report will be from the community and presented to FHWA, who will evaluate all the alternatives. It was mentioned the Stakeholder's Meeting is a way for dialogue to occur between the community and the project team. Members can submit information from the community that the project team is unaware exist.

It was brought to the attention of the group by Ms. Lewis-Wells (Business Owner) how Coca-Cola was able to close off a portion of Cousar Street. Jacob Meetze (SCDOT) identified the question has been addressed by the project team under the "Frequently Asked Questions" on the project's website <u>http://www.scdot.org/inside/BishopvilleTruckRoute/default.aspx</u>.

Sandy Jenkins (Santee Wateree RTA) asked if funding for construction of the project is available. Jacob Meetze (SCDOT) stated \$15 million has been set aside for the project and that only project alternatives that are deemed reasonable and feasible will be studied in detail in the report.




Proposed Bishopville Truck Route Project Bishopville, Lee County, South Carolina Northeast Quadrant Segment Alternatives Map














Proposed Bishopville Truck Route Project Bishopville, Lee County, South Carolina Southeast Quadrant Segment Alternatives Map






The original Environmental Assessment which was completed in 2012 proposed five alternatives to route trucks away from downtown Bishopville and looked at two truck routes on existing roads. These seven options were used as the basis for the development of the 24 preliminary alternative corridors.


Public input received last spring and through field studies was considered in the development of these 24 alternative corridors.

Every corridor presented tonight was evaluated on its ability to reduce truck traffic traveling through downtown Bishopville on Main Street while still enabling freight to move through the region.



Some of the alternative corridors that were initially investigated were eliminated from further consideration:

- Corridors, which utilized the existing roadway network and only relocated trucks off Main Street, but kept them in the vicinity of downtown were eliminated because they did not keep trucks from passing through downtown, they just moved trucks off of US 15 and onto surrounding streets.
- We heard local concerns about the impact of truck traffic within neighborhoods such as the James Street area. Corridors and segments which divided neighborhoods were eliminated. As the new corridors were developed, the project team tried to distance each alternative from adjacent neighborhoods as much as possible.
- Corridor segments that were similar with other alternatives were either eliminated or merged with a similar alternative to make certain each of the 24 Preliminary Alternative offers a unique alignment.



Here are all of the 24 corridors currently under consideration. The preliminary alternative corridors are shown in great detail on the presentation boards in the main display area.

Each corridor includes several different segments.


The segments designated by the various colors and numbers. Corridor segments were combined in various combinations to create the alternative corridors presented this evening.

Most corridors are 500 feet in width while some have been expanded to 1100 feet wide in areas where additional options could be necessary. The corridor width of 500-1100 feet is the area we are using for the field investigation and is not the required right of way for the final roadway segment. The final alignment will be somewhere within the corridor shown and actual roadway right of way widths will be less than 150 feet.



- The ability of each segment to meet the project's purpose and need of getting trucks out of downtown while still moving freight across the region.

Each corridor offered some opportunities but also some challenges.




In the northeast quadrant of the project, challenges include:

- Public concerns about disturbing neighborhood cohesiveness and agricultural lands
- Wetlands and streams
- The Seaboard Coast Line Railroad
- Robert E. Lee Academy
- and, the Town of Bishopville Water Treatment Plant




In the northwest quadrant, challenges included:

- Existing and proposed industrial businesses




And finally, challenges in the southeast quadrant included:

- More historic properties
- Numerous wetlands and streams
- Agricultural lands
- The Seaboard Coast Line Railroad crossing
- And, concerns about disturbing neighborhoods

As the corridors were developed and each challenge was thoroughly considered. Not one of the challenges was given priority over the others, all of the challenges were treated equally.

Because it was not possible to avoid every potential impact, our goals were to find alternatives, which minimized all the impacts to the greatest extent.



If you attended any of our previous meetings, you will recognize this slide which is an overview of the National Environmental Policy Act or NEPA process drives our work and schedule.

Identifying different alternatives, weighing their ability to meet the project's purpose and need, and addressing all of the potential project challenges is a part of the National Environmental Policy Act or NEPA process.

NEPA is a multi-step process that requires projects seeking federal funds to consider project impacts and invite public participation and your feedback.

The Project Team has completed initiation steps in starting the Environmental Impact Statement or EIS. We have completed a majority of our data collection activities. We are early in the analysis phase and this is a point in which your local input is very important.

Looking forward –

Your input will help us determine our reasonable alternatives which will be presented to you late fall or early winter of this year.

Once we have identified the reasonable alternatives we can begin to develop and analyze the alternative roadway segments and alignments to determine impacts to the Community and Natural Environment.

This information will be incorporated into a Draft Environmental Impact Statement, which will plan to share with you a public hearing next summer.

At next summer's Public Hearing, the project team will recommend which preferred alternative should move forward into final design or if the challenges of the different alternatives are such that a "No-Build " alternative should be selected.

The Draft Environmental Impact Statement presented at the public hearing will move to a Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision after receiving and reviewing comments from the public hearing. We expect the final Record of Decision as to how the project should proceed to be completed in early 2020.










Preliminary Alternative Corridors Public Meeting



Purpose and Need

The primary purpose of this project is to address the existing and future truck traffic traveling through downtown Bishopville. The secondary purpose is to enhance the economic development of the area. As alternatives are developed, their ability to meet these purposes will be evaluated.

US 15 / N. Main Street through downtown Bishopville is currently a two-lane roadway with a raised median and on-street parking. On average, over 700 large commercial trucks travel this corridor daily. Development of the proposed truck route is considered necessary to reduce the existing and future truck congestion through downtown.

Purpose of Tonight's Meeting

The purpose of this meeting is for SCDOT to present several preliminary build alternative corridors that are being considered to address the project's purpose of reducing existing and future truck volumes traveling through downtown Bishopville on US 15/North Main Street. A no-build alternative will also be evaluated by the project team.

Another purpose of the meeting is to gather information from the public or any interested organization on historic or cultural resources in the area. The preliminary routes and segments under consideration were developed after feedback from last year's project scoping meeting, field research, as well as any potential environmental and community impacts. SCDOT, along with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), will use information and feedback gathered at this meeting and through public comments to further evaluate these routes and segments before determining the reasonable alternatives, and ultimately the recommended preferred alternative.

The meeting's informal, drop-in format will display each preliminary alternative corridor. SCDOT staff and project team members are available to gather feedback, answer questions, and to address specific concerns.
